Executive Director's Report

Dan Dirks Announces Retirement from SMART after 30 Years

Dan G. Dirks, a good friend of the Michigan Paralyzed Veterans of America, announced that he will retire from Suburban Mobility Authority for Regional Transportation (SMART) effective June 30, 2007, after 30 years working his up the ranks from student intern to the longest serving General Manager in the history of the agency.

Each political movement has its heroes. They are bigger than life. They are members of the community they serve. They inspire just by their presence. The disability rights movement is unique in that we have many leaders. However, if you were to ask whether one person in Southeastern Michigan had an overwhelmingly positive impact on the quality of transportation for the disability community, the name you'd hear most often would be "Dan Dirks."

As SMART's longest-tenured General Manager (nearly 10 years at the top) Dan's accomplishments were far-ranging. He guided SMART through three successful mileage elections, bolstered ridership, created a community partnership program that has become a national model, replaced the fixed route fleet with ramp equipped buses and has elevated the awareness of SMART's role in public transit. He advocated at the local and state level for enhance-

ment of public transit for senior citizens and people with disabilities.

Dan's management philosophy is similar to that of any successful business: Listen to your customers, drivers, businesses and local elected officials in determining the appropriate service levels and routes while staying on budget. Ridership at SMART has flourished under Dirks guidance. Today, over 40,000 rides a day are provided by SMART.

Dan's numerous advocacy efforts over the years have supported the rights and needs of the disabled. He testified before Congress in the late 1980s in support of the Americans with Disabilities Act. During the 70's, Dirks was an advocate for senior citizens and people with disabilities. Dan's commitment was significant in making SEMTA (Southeast Michigan Transportation Authority, SMART's predecessor) the first transit agency in the country to be 100% wheelchair accessible.

Early in his career Dirks was the liaison between SMART and the disabled and senior citizen communities. These groups are great partners of SMART's offering input in service design, vehicle purchase and marketing of services. Dirks was involved in the development of the first SMART advisory committee. Started in 1976, the SMART Advisory Council (formerly the Elderly and Handicap Committee) was one of the first in the country.

In 1989, MPVA honored Dan Dirks by presenting him with our highest honor, the Brooks/Royal Award. Named after the original founders of MPVA, the award is given to an individual whose contributions have furthered MPVA's goals while making extraordinary contributions to the quality of life for people with disabilities. Dan leaves a legacy of accomplishment and continuous improvement at SMART. His pride in the SMART team and his commitment to SMART's mission is reflected in the enthusiasm he brought to work each day. He has accomplished what every leader wants; he is leaving an organization that is better today than it was before his tenure. For that we thank you!

Veterans' News

WHO IS A DEPENDENT?

In this column I would like to give you a little service officer 101 course, relative to dependents.

I want to explain who the Department of Veterans Affairs considers a legal dependent of a veteran. Any change in your dependent status should be reported to your PVA Service Office as soon as possible.

Spouse= means a person of the opposite sex who is legally married to a veteran.

Surviving Spouse= means a person of the opposite sex who is legally married to the veteran and who was the spouse of the veteran at the time of the veteran's death. This person must have lived with the veteran continuously from the date of marriage to the date of the veteran's death except where there was a separation which was due to the misconduct of, or procured by, the veteran without the fault of the spouse; and has not remarried or has not since the death of the veteran and after September 19, 1962, lived with another person of the opposite sex and held himself or herself out openly to the public to be the spouse of such other person. Remarriage of a surviving spouse terminated by death, divorce, or annulment, will not bar the furnishing of benefits relating to the survivors and dependents.

Child= means an unmarried person who is a legitimate child, a child legally adopted before the age of 18 years, a stepchild who acquired that status before the age of 18 years and who is a member of the veteran's household or was a member of the veteran's household at the time of the veteran's death. An illegitimate child; and who is under the age of 18 years is a legal child. One who became permanently incapable of self-support before reaching the age of 18 years is also considered a legal child of the veteran.

A child that after reaching the age of 18 years and until completion of education or training (but not after reaching the age of 23 years) is pursuing a course of instruction at an educational institution approved by the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Parent= means a natural mother or father (including the mother of an illegitimate child of the father of an illegitimate child of the usual family relationship existed), mother or father through adoption, or

a person who for a period of not less than 1 year stood in the relationship of a parent to a veteran at any time before his or her entry into active service.

Foster relationship must have begun prior to the veteran's 21st birthday. Not more than one father and one mother, as will be recognized. If two persons stood in the relationship of father or mother for 1 year or more, the person who last stood in such relationship before the veteran's last entry into active service will be recognized as the parent.

MPVA Young Friends Club First Activity, Putt Putt Golf in Hell

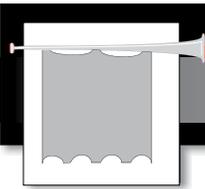


MPVA Awards Two \$500 College Scholarships

VA Prosecutes Defrauders of Veterans

Nicholson: "Full Force of Law" to Protect Earned Benefits

WASHINGTON (June 12, 2007) - Continuing a long-standing campaign to identify and prosecute those who defraud veterans of their rightful benefits, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) recently highlighted several successes by its Inspector General in investigating people who mishandle the finances of veterans and family members unable to manage their own affairs.

"VA is committed to protecting our veterans, especially our most vulnerable veterans. We will investigate and help bring charges against anyone suspected of defrauding veterans of the disability compensation or any other assistance they have earned," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Jim Nicholson. "Fiduciary fraud is a heinous crime. We will bring the full force of law against offenders."

From January 2005 through April 5 this year, VA's Office of Inspector General investigated 61 cases of alleged fiduciary fraud. Twenty-seven people were indicted on related charges, of whom 19 have been convicted so far. Resulting penalties have included \$1.9 million in court-ordered restitution for veterans or their estates, 191 months' imprisonment and 838 months of probation.

Among recent cases successfully prosecuted as a result of investigations by VA's Office of the Inspector General:

* Los Angeles resident Anne Chavis pleaded guilty to perjury and forgery in embezzling \$1 million from veterans who were too disabled to handle their own financial matters. She is awaiting sentencing.

* The daughter and son-in-law of an elderly Alaskan veteran with Alzheimer's disease diverted about \$500,000 from the veteran to make personal purchases while failing to pay the veteran's bills. Phyllis Talas was sentenced to 60 months' probation, and Frank Talas to six months' incarceration and 36 months' probation.

* A Washington state woman overseeing her niece's VA benefits pleaded guilty to misappropriating funds and was sentenced to 36 months of probation. Christina May diverted to her personal use funds from VA's Dependency and Indemnity Compensation awarded to her under-age niece.

Michigan Stadium Up-date

A federal judge may eventually decide if the University of Michigan complies with federal accessibility guidelines as it proceeds with the renovation and expansion of Michigan Stadium.

On behalf of the Michigan Paralyzed Veterans of America (MPVA), attorney Richard Bernstein filed a federal lawsuit asking that the judge halt the ongoing upgrades and plans for the renovation of Michigan Stadium because we believe that the plans violate the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

As of now, the University hasn't changed its position on the plan to locate wheelchair seating on the west concourse directly behind the upper bowl despite MPVA's continuing efforts to educate the University on ADA and why the plan is in violation of federal standards.

The ADA states that "Seats for people using wheelchairs need to be "an integral part of the seating plan." Facilities with more than 300 seats, such as Michigan Stadium, are required to provide wheelchair-accessible seating intermingled among other seats throughout the stadium.

We see several problems with the approved design. For one, the plan doesn't offer a range of admission prices and seating for wheelchair users. Fans in wheelchairs won't have the same choices as the general public and that's a significant ADA violation.

It was our hope that the University would seek a plan that improves choices for wheelchair users. As it is now, wheelchair users are excluded from the most sections in Michigan Stadium with available seating behind each end zone in unpopular locations with poor views. We're already isolated from the other spectators and from the full football experience.

An on-going project at the Stadium since 2004 has been the removal and replacement of concrete surfaces and the replacement of benches throughout the seating bowl. It's our understanding that the project will soon be completed. The University position has been, and continues to be, that this work is nothing more than repairs, therefore excluding them from meeting the higher accessibility requirements. MPVA disagrees. We consider their project an alteration as defined by ADA, not a mere repair.

At no time has the University offered any support for their position. We have asked them repeatedly to provide any information, factual or legal, that demonstrates or supports the assertion that the concrete project does not constitute an alteration that triggers additional legal obligations on the part of the University. To this date, they haven't produced anything!

Conclusion:

MPVA believes that the lawsuit is more far-reaching than simply providing wheelchair access during football games. A federal court ruling in favor of the University could have a devastating impact on the ADA because it would open the door for other developers looking to sidestep ADA provisions.

The court must draw a distinction between "repair" and "alteration" projects, since the latter compels developers and property owners to comply with the ADA accessibility guidelines. As long as those terms are left undefined, disabled individuals will find it more difficult to use public venues, such as movie theaters, shopping malls; etc.

We believe that the on-going stadium renovation and construction trigger higher compliance and that the University of Michigan has a legal obligation to ensure that wheelchair seating is dispersed throughout the stadium in all price ranges with multiple choices of viewing areas. The plan approved by the Board of Regents in November of 2006 does not meet this legal standard.

We know that the University could choose a better plan. In fact, the University of Notre Dame football stadium is modeled (on a smaller scale) after the University of Michigan's mammoth stadium. When Notre Dame Stadium was renovated and expanded in 1997, they made certain that wheelchair users were given a range of admission prices and views to choose from. Given that these stadiums are architectural carbon copies there is no plausible reason why the University of Michigan can't duplicate what Notre Dame accomplished. It can be done, and it has been done.

The University, in their efforts to gather public support for the project has gone on record indicating "it's important that we get it right because this project has to carry the University forward for the next 75 years." We agree. It's for that reason that they have both a legal and a moral obligation to get it right. Not to do so would be contrary to the principles of justice and inclusion that the University has always held close.

The University of Michigan now has an opportunity to understand, embrace, and follow laws that give specific direction regarding accessibility at Michigan Stadium.

The University and its contractors would be well advised to review the ADA standards and note the many ways that the current Stadium plans fail to meet those standards.

The ADA is not a suggestion; it is a set of federal guidelines that assist in the development of a truly diverse and culturally-rich university experience. ♿
