# Executive Director's Report

## Wayne State University is getting it Right!

### No child left behind.

**T**hat is the current educational system that was signed into law by President Bush in 2001. The question that has to be asked is: does this law include people dependent on the use of a wheelchair for mobility. Education for all cannot be guaranteed when the school has no wheelchair access.

With this in mind, in 2006, I had an opportunity to speak at a meeting before the Wayne State University (WSU) Board of Governors suggesting that the planned capital improvements projects to up-grade the campus infrastructure presented a golden opportunity for the University to address existing barrier free access deficiencies in and around the campus.

It was recommended that the University establish an advisory committee with the goal of ensuring that architectural barriers were removed in existing facilities and that new construction was done in compliance with federal/state accessibility guidelines.

The make-up of the committee was very impressive. There was representation from University's Board of Governors, administration, faculty, student body, and the Michigan Paralyzed Veterans of America (MPVA).

The mission of the Board was to do the following:

- Promote the development of a physical and social environment that provides full access of programs, services, and facilities to every person in the University community (students, faculty, staff, and guests).
- Advance the University's commitment to the quality of experience for all persons, including those with disabilities.
- Act in an advisory capacity to recommend University programs and policies that assure full opportunity and access to qualified individuals with disabilities.
- Advocate for the concerns of members of the University community who have disabilities.
- Educate the University community by increasing our awareness of and sensitivity to all issues related to individuals who have disabilities.

As disabled students enroll in greater numbers

at colleges and universities, they are discovering services and accommodations that didn't exist even five years ago: door-to-door transportation, specially designed computer equipment, and individually-tailored academic curriculum.

But they also encounter persistent obstacles such as misperceptions about their capabilities on the part of faculty and fellow students, inaccessible buildings, and administrative decision-making that can be well-intentioned but misguided.

Our organization believes that the determining factor in enabling people to access facilities with ease, safety, independence, and dignity comes down to the application of accessibility practices.

More and more, classroom and campus accessibility is moving to the forefront of university facility design. The topic has gained prominence as an increasing number of veterans return from service with disabilities wanting to begin or return to college.

Aside from required mandates and regulations required by state/federal laws, universities are adopting their own accessibility guidelines, spurred on by changing demographics and students population needs. Increasing competition among universities for a limited pool of students is a driving force in generating accessible facilities – sometimes well beyond legal requirements currently on the books.

For the educational system to provide a fulfilling educational experience it must ensure that students with disabilities can complete their academic responsibilities without confronting physical or attitudinal barriers. This can be best achieved by allowing all stakeholders (students, parents, and instructors) to give insight to the university on the issues that make an impact on their particular disability.

Allowing students with disabilities the opportunity to be educated alongside their fellow students has resulted in an enormous amount of social learning for everyone. They have an opportunity to see firsthand the challenges experienced by students with disabilities and how they are able to find solutions to deal with the challenges they are confronted with. Hopefully, they become sensitized to the needs of others, and learn that people with disabilities are worthwhile and valuable members of the community.

Section 504 and the ADA require colleges and universities to follow minimum standards for accommodation and access for disabled students. While this has increased access to postsecondary education for many students with disabilities, these standards should only be the starting point.

To WSU credit, they have moved beyond just mere compliance to create an inclusive educational environment for all students. Moving beyond compliance provides all students with richer learning environments that promote participation and acceptance.

The university has demonstrated they are committed to the full inclusion of individuals with disabilities with the goal of continually improving the accessibility of the campus, programs, services and activities.

WSU believes that a diverse environment has educational benefits. Students learn better when the learning occurs in a setting where students interact and exchange ideas with others who are different from them. Diverse classrooms allow students to grow intellectually through challenging long held beliefs and ideas.



## New HAMP Enhancements will help Military Homeowners

There are a lot of military families that make sacrifices for our nation everyday and the last thing our brave men and women of the armed forces should have to worry about when they are deployed is, "Will I have a house to come home to after service?"

Unfortunately, for many military families this has become more difficult in the wake of the housing crisis. Many military families as well as other Americans are underwater on their mortgages and in some cases the military homeowner who had been faithfully paying their mortgage on time, face a real risk of falling behind if he/she receives orders for a permanent change of station (PCS) or move to another base and the family has to relocate to live separately.

Under recently announced changes to Home Affordable Modification Program (HAMP), which went into effect June 1, military homeowners and other families who are permanently displaced by a job-related move may still qualify as owner-occupants, which means they may still qualify for a HAMP mortgage modification. The new criteria states that a borrower may qualify if he or she:

- Is displaced due to an out-of-area job transfer such as PCS orders and was occupying the home as a principal residence immediately prior to the displacement;
- Intends to return to the home at some point in the future; and
- Does not own any other single-family real estate.

Military and other families who do own other residential properties may still qualify for a HAMP modification under expanded opportunities available for rental properties announced by Treasury in January. They also may qualify for a short sale through Treasury's Home Affordable Foreclosure Alternatives Program (HAFA).

In the last few weeks, Treasury and the Office of Service member Affairs at the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) have worked together to address this issue. And, as a result, Treasury is making important changes to its Home Affordable Modification Program (HAMP) that will provide more opportunities for mortgage assistance to military homeowners.

Protections for military homeowners were included in the recent settlement between the Federal government, 49 state Attorneys General, and five of the largest mortgage loan servicers: Bank of America, JP Morgan Chase, Citigroup, Wells Fargo, and Ally Financial.

The mortgage servicers who signed the settlement have agreed to review their files for violations of the Service members Civil Relief Act (SCRA). They will give monetary relief to those families who saw their homes taken from them in violation of the SCRA, or who did not receive the SCRA interest-rate reduction to which they were entitled. In one way the settlement goes farther than the SCRA: it protects from non-judicial foreclosure all military homeowners who are deployed to a combat zone, even if the mortgage was not obtained before the service member entered active duty.

The settlement also has provisions for military homeowners who get Permanent Change of Station (PCS) orders. The banks will provide short-sale agreements and deficiency waivers to those service members who were forced to sell their home at a loss due to a PCS and were not eligible for the military's Homeowners Assistance Program (HAP). This will help service members who were underwater

on homes they bought between July 1, 2006 and December 31, 2008, or who received a PCS after October 1, 2010.

The servicers are also going to pay \$10 million to the Veterans Housing Benefit Program Fund, which is used by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to guarantee VA loans on favorable terms for eligible veterans.

If you feel that your rights were violated by one of the mortgage servicers in the settlement you can call the Justice Department at 1-800-896-7743. But you don't have to call in order to get the help offered by the settlement, and you shouldn't give information or money to anyone who says they will help you get in on the settlement! If the banks in the settlement owe you money they will try to find you; you don't need to fill out an application or file a claim.

## July August 2012 Tightlines.

**F**or most Americans, Memorial Day is celebrated on the fourth Monday in May. But for me, the official start of Memorial Day kicks off one week prior, during the “Tight Lines for Troops” Veterans Fishing Tournament.

The event, now in its third year, was hosted by the Brain Injury Association of Michigan (BIAMI) and the Michigan Paralyzed Veterans of America (MPVA).

On May 19th, 2012, Manistee County Charter Captains join other fishing boat Captains from around Northern Michigan to host close to 300 Michigan military service personnel and Veterans on 52- four-person “Teams.”

Lake Michigan Charter Boat Captains gave up a day’s pay to honor veterans from World War II to Afghanistan. Veterans that had difficulty paying for the trip were given financial support to help offset the cost in their travel, meals & lodging and the purchase of a fishing license.

This year’s event featured a “Who’s Who” of American military history with representatives from an assortment of wars and generations. There were 9 WWII veterans fishing side by side with 7 Korean War veterans, 94 Vietnam veterans, 21 from Desert Shield, 31 from Operation Iraqi Freedom and 12 Operation Enduring Freedom (Afghanistan).

Five boats carried veterans from the Army, Marines, Air Force, Navy and Coast Guard where a friendly rivalry was created amongst the branches of the arm forces. This year the Air Force won the Governors Cup.

The brainchild behind the fishing tournament was Army veteran and Manistee County Charter Boat Captain, Bob Guenthardt. His motivation for hosting the event was to express his gratitude to disabled veterans for their distinguished military service and the sacrifice they made on behalf of our Nation.

Around dawn on Saturday morning the boats gathered on Lake Michigan at the mouth of the Manistee River Channel. With all the boat engines turned off, the bagpipers performed Amazing Grace. Sitting back listening to their rendition with my fellow veterans is something I will never forget. I don’t think there was a dry eye out there.

At the conclusion of the tournament boats again gathered together in the harbor and were escorted down the River Channel by the United States Coast Guard all the way to Seng’s Marina on Manistee Lake. At the entrance to the channel on both piers and all along the riverwalk hundreds of people gathered, standing shoulder to shoulder saluting, cheering and welcoming the veterans back from their excursion – with over five hundred American Flags, provided by Rolling Thunder Chapter 1 and Patriot Guard, blowing in the breeze. It was an incredibly moving

and very emotional moment for many.

I can assure you that the veterans who participated in the event were treated like VIP's, and journeyed home with the greatest of memories of this event.

The following quote describes the comments we heard from so many:

**“This is the Welcome Home I never received. After all these years, I cried because I didn't realize how much it meant to me. I was proud to take part.”**

The event was capped off with an awards ceremony along with a dinner donated by the Little River Casino Resorts.

Without the support of many this event would have never been possible. All the heavy lifting for the event was provided by Bob Guenthardt, Rick Briggs and Judy Ball.

I want to personally thank the Boat Captains for donating their time and resources. Saturday is a prime day in the charter boat industry. For them to have given up an opportunity for a big payday to honor disabled veterans is a statement within itself!

The collective efforts of over 200 volunteers including representatives of Rolling Thunder MI Chapter #1, Little River Casino Resort, LRBOI Warrior Society, Seng's Marina, US Coast Guard, Manistee National Guard Armory, American Legion Men's Auxiliary who hosted the Captains dinner, VFW, American Legion, Local Boy Scouts, Manistee Chamber of Commerce, BIAMI and MPVA, and countless others worthy of recognition made this year's event the most successful Tight Lines for Troops tournament to date.

Special thanks go out to everyone who sponsored the event. Without their support this day would not have been possible. Their donation is a tribute to those who honorably served, and are serving, our country. Many of these veterans would have been unable to travel to Manistee for the event; most would never have been able to afford a charter fishing trip, a hotel, or even fuel for the trip. Cash donations allowed us to provide financial assistance to veterans most in need, and also to help offset the expenses of the actual tournament – trophies, t-shirts, etc.


