In April 2011, Nick moved back to Michigan where he continued to donate his time assisting veterans' charities. Through those efforts, he was offered a job with the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) as a National Service Officer assisting and educating veterans with the VA. He has gone on to compete in 9 marathons, including Boston and NYC on a handcycle. Since April 2013, he has been working with fellow combat wounded amputee and owner of Derick Carver of Bayonet Crossfit developing an adaptive crossfit program for persons with disabilities. In June of 2013, he married his best friend, Dani Koulchar, who continues to support him in all of his adventures. Nick recently joined the PVA Handcycling Team and hopes to compete at several events this year, including the 2014 Veterans Wheelchair Games.



Delta Airline Terminal Installs Relief Area for Service Animals

Although I am not a “guest” to the MPVA and the articles published in this newsletter, I am writing this article on behalf of many happy K-9’s traveling through Metro Detroit. A Service Animal Relief Area has been installed in Detroit Metropolitan Airport’s McNamara Terminal that will make the flying experience more enjoyable for everyone involved.

Delta Airlines and Detroit Metropolitan Airport, working in conjunction with “PAWS with a Cause,” has opened the hub’s first Service Animal Relief Area near gate A-34 of the McNamara Terminal. Prior to the opening of this facility, passengers with service animals would need to exit the terminal, go outside to find the relief area on the International Arrivals level and then re-enter security.

Inside the relief area are two “porch potties,” one with simulated grass, a second with real grass, and even a fake fire hydrant. Solid waste disposal bags and disposal instructions are available and mini sprinkler systems rinse the grass after each animal has accomplished its duty with all due dignity. The wide entrance easily accommodates wheelchairs while blocking the view of the public.

The relief area is free and offers a sink for filling water bottles and washing hands and is large enough to accommodate one or two dogs at a time.



Detroit Metro certainly isn't alone as an airport that offers service animals somewhere to relieve themselves. Most major American airports have a designated area

for service animals (as required by law) but travelers are usually required to leave the terminal. However, Detroit Metro joins an elite few as an airport that offers enclosed indoor facilities for jet-setting dogs.



MPVA applauds Delta Airline and Detroit Metropolitan Airport for their commitment for making air transportation more accessible and convenient to people with disabilities and their Service Animal.





Executive Director's Report

Insurance Company Refuse Because Wheelchair Wasn't Insured

A few weeks ago I was beyond disturbed, but sadly not surprised, to read about insurance companies like State Farm attempting to block payments to a wheelchair user who was involved in an accident with an automobile. For too long, insurance companies have practiced the art of delaying, denying and defending against insurance claims instead of acting in good faith.

Recently, an article appeared in the Macomb Daily detailing State Farm refusal of coverage to a disabled person who was hit by a car while crossing the street in his motorized wheelchair. The insurance company's refusal to pay out benefits was because the person did not have Michigan No-Fault Auto Insurance coverage on his motorized wheelchair.

State Farm's legal position is that the motorized wheelchair is a "motor vehicle," therefore, because the person was uninsured, they are not eligible to receive benefits under Michigan No-fault that someone would normally be entitled to under Michigan law.

State Farm says any wheelchair or any motorized scooter should have No-fault insurance just like a car or truck – even though there is presently no insurance company that is even selling such a coverage, including State Farm.

Also, it is State Farm's belief, under Michigan law, treating the person as an "uninsured" motorist would also bar them from suing the at-fault driver (the driver of the car that hit him) for their pain and suffering compensation. But at the same time, it would allow the wheelchair user to be sued by Farm Bureau, the insurance company for the at-fault driver, for his accident related medical costs, lost wages and vehicle damage.

Normally, under the Michigan law, the wheelchair user would be entitled to be covered under the provisions of No-fault because they were struck while crossing the street in their wheelchair. The person would be allowed to file a personal injury protection claim under their No-fault benefits coverage from the at-fault vehicle.

State Farm's legal position in this case is absolutely outrageous. It discriminates against the elderly, the disabled and anyone who uses a motorized wheelchair in Michigan.

Legislators need to fix our state's insurance system. Instead of doing away with no-fault, they should first look to laws that would prevent outrageous denials of claims from happening like what State Farm is doing in wheelchair-vehicle collisions. Any insurance company that is found to intentionally deny legitimate claims should be punished. Denying legitimate claims is no less fraudulent than an individual who files a false claim. Forcing legitimate accident victims to go to court just to recover their benefits is inexcusable.

Finally, we must have transparency. Because we have lifetime injury care in this state, the Michigan legislature created the Michigan Catastrophic Claims Association to reimburse insurers for claims that reach a certain cost threshold.

Unfortunately, this critically important association is controlled entirely by insurance companies without any public oversight whatsoever. The MCCA currently charges drivers nearly \$200 for every vehicle they insure and provides absolutely no information on how those rates are set. The public has a right to know how the MCCA calculates its rates so that we can be sure we are being charged fairly and that our auto insurance system remains well funded.

We can all agree that companies, like State Farm, have no right and should be ashamed of themselves for trying to deny coverage to a wheelchair user for an accident that was not their fault. The problem with

this situation is not Michigan's life-saving no-fault laws but insurance company greed.

Status of VA Legislation from PVA

As a follow-up to our Spring Edition of the Rollin' Times and the issues surrounding the VA health system, I wanted to be sure to keep our readers aware of the work PVA is doing on behalf of our service men and women. Please take a moment to read the following press release that was issued in late August from PVA:

WASHINGTON, DC—In response to the compromise agreement—H.R. 3230, the “Veterans Access, Choice, and Accountability Act of 2014”—reached between Senate Committee on Veterans’ Affairs Chairman Bernie Sanders and House Committee on Veterans’ Affairs Chairman Jeff Miller yesterday, Paralyzed Veterans of America (Paralyzed Veterans) National President Al Kovach released the following statement:

“Paralyzed Veterans is encouraged by the compromise agreement. The legislation will address the broad range of problems that veterans face trying to access care in the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) health care system. While our concerns about the ‘veterans choice’ provisions of the proposed agreement remain, we appreciate the fact that the legislation also takes initial steps to strengthen the internal capacity of the VA by hiring more doctors, nurses, and other health care providers.

We continue to emphasize that for members of Paralyzed Veterans—veterans with spinal cord injury or dysfunction—the VA is the only truly viable option for health care. Comparable services do not exist in the private sector. This fact reinforces the need to expand capacity and bring more providers into the VA health care system. We recognize the benefits

that veterans without service-connected disabilities or with service-connected disabilities that are not catastrophic will receive by having greater access to care in the best location (whether within the VA or in the private sector). We also understand that it is a delicate balancing act to provide timely, quality care to veterans who rely solely on the VA for services, and those veterans who have options. We believe this legislation does a good job of striking that balance.

Unfortunately, we believe the agreement could do more to address the physical infrastructure needs of the VA. Recent appropriations have provided woefully inadequate resources to address this problem, and the compromise agreement generally does not address this issue as well. While we are pleased to see that positive steps are being taken to finally get new major medical facility leases around the country open and providing care, greater emphasis needs to be placed on building out more physical space to accommodate the real demand, which includes those veterans who had accessed VA health care as well as the thousands who desired to but were either waitlisted or had given up altogether.

Paralyzed Veterans calls on Congress to immediately approve the conference agreement for H.R. 3230 so that the VA can immediately begin implementing these critically important provisions. Additionally, we call on Congress to complete its work on the FY 2015 Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act. The VA should not be handcuffed by the partisan bickering and political gridlock that once again has it facing a late appropriation.”

Major Veterans Legislation Signed Into Law

On August 7, 2014, the President signed into law P.L. 113-146, the “Veterans’ Access to Care Through Choice, Accountability, and Transparency Act” (previously H.R. 3230). The law reflects the compromise developed between House Committee on Veterans’ Affairs Chairman Jeff Miller (R-FL) and Senate Committee on Veterans’ Affairs Chairman Bernie Sanders (I-VT).

The centerpiece of the legislation is the so-called “choice” provisions that presumably offer certain veterans a choice about where they can receive health care services—either from the VA or a private provider. The law allows for expanded contract care if a veteran has requested an appointment but not been seen or if a veteran lives at least 40 miles from the nearest VA facility (VAMC, CBOC, etc.). The law requires the VA to issue a “Choice Card” to all eligible veterans. Veterans eligible for the choice option had to either enroll in VA health care prior to August 1, 2014 or be a Post-9/11 combat veteran who is still within the authorized five-year window to enroll in VA health care. This provision was put in place to limit the number of veterans coming to the VA to take advantage of the choice option, thereby holding down the costs of the legislation. The overall cost of the bill is approximately \$17.0 billion. Approximately \$10.0 billion is directed for the purchased care option. This provision of the law is required to be implemented within 90 days of enactment.

The law also authorizes \$5.0 billion to increase capacity by hiring additional direct care providers (doctors,

nurses, etc.). The bill includes authorizations for 27 new capital leases. It also provides the VA Secretary the authority to fire Senior Executive Service (SES) employees more easily with expedited appeals rights for the SES employee. PVA was pleased to see that the compromise bill included these provisions to hire additional doctors, nurses, and other health care providers. We have long argued that the access problems that have been identified around the country are a reflection of the lack of internal capacity.

Unfortunately, we do not believe that the compromise legislation does enough to address the physical infrastructure problems that exist across the system. The VA identified serious physical infrastructure resource needs in a supplemental request in July; however, that concern was largely ignored by Congress.

PVA will continue to monitor the implementation of this legislation as the expanded option to seek private health care could ultimately undermine the existing VA health care system. In the meantime, we would encourage PVA members to keep National staff informed as the choice option is rolled out across the country.

Veterans arrived in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania this past August for the Annual Veterans Wheelchair Games. The Games are presented by the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Paralyzed Veterans of America (PVA). It is the largest wheelchair sports event in the world. The athletes are comprised of U.S. military veterans who use wheelchairs for sports competition due to spinal cord injuries, neurological conditions, amputations and other mobility impairments. Attracting more than 500 athletes each year, the NVWG is the largest annual wheelchair sports event in the world.

While past Games have produced a number of national and world-class champions, the Games also provide opportunities for newly-disabled veterans to gain sports skills and be exposed to other wheelchair athletes. Typically, one quarter of the competitors have never before participated in any type of organized

wheelchair sports competition. Among the athletes were 10 veterans, sponsored by the MPVA, who were able to demonstrate their athleticism in over 18 different events such as swimming, basketball, quad rugby, and archery!
